Building a Stronger, More Protected Athletic Department

Across the country, athletic departments are facing increased scrutiny around eligibility, participation reporting, and documentation standards. Spring offers a critical opportunity to evaluate whether your current processes will withstand the demands of the coming year. This checklist is designed to help you proactively assess areas of operational risk and administrative vulnerability. The goal is not perfection – it is preparedness. Strong structure today protects your coaches, your students, and your department tomorrow.

Why “Spring Cleaning”?

Spring is the only window where athletic departments can:

- Clean up registration workflows
- Clarify eligibility documentation
- Review transfer processes
- Align communication expectations
- Prepare for participation reporting
- Reduce fall chaos

The decisions made in spring often determine whether fall feels controlled or chaotic.

Your 4 Pressure Points

1. Eligibility & Transfer Documentation

Inconsistent forms. Missing records. Appeal confusion.

2. Participation Reporting

Manual counts. Spreadsheet reconciliation. Duplicate data entry.

3. Coach & Staff Protection

Unclear clearance status. Training verification gaps.

4. Family Communication Overload

Email chains. Text threads. No single source of truth.

The goal of this toolkit is simple: bring clarity to your processes before pressure arrives. Use the following checklist to evaluate your current systems and identify small adjustments that can make a meaningful difference next year.

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The “Spring Cleaning” Checklist

Part 1 of 2

Registration & Forms

Section 1 of 4

- Are all required forms reviewed and updated for next school year (dates, language, policies)?
- Are sport-specific requirements clearly defined and standardized?
- Is your clearance process uniform across all sports and levels?
- Do families submit all documentation in a single, centralized system?
- Are medical forms date-stamped and version-controlled?
- Can you verify that no athlete is participating prior to full clearance?
- Are returning athlete workflows simplified to reduce redundant submissions?
- Are coach and volunteer requirements tracked in the same system as athletes?

Why this matters: Fragmented registration creates risk, coach exposure, and fall chaos.

Eligibility & Transfers

Section 2 of 4

- Can you produce eligibility documentation for any athlete within minutes?
- Is transfer documentation centralized and time-stamped?
- Are transfer approval workflows consistent and documented?
- Are eligibility rules clearly embedded in your process (not reliant on memory)?
- Is there a documented chain of custody for eligibility decisions?
- Can you quickly generate a report of all transfer athletes?
- Are hardship exceptions tracked with supporting documentation?
- Could you provide participation data to district or state leadership within 24 hours if requested?

Why this matters: Eligibility inconsistencies are increasingly becoming controversial flashpoints.

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Part 2 of 2

Participation Data & Reporting

Section 3 of 4

- Can you produce real-time participation numbers without manual compilation?
- Do you track by sport, gender, level, and season?
- Are participation numbers aligned with roster verification?
- Can you reconcile participation totals against clearance records?
- Will NFHS reporting require manual spreadsheet cleanup?
- Are you able to view participation trends year-over-year?
- Can district or state leadership access aggregate data if requested?
- Do you maintain historical participation records in an organized format?

Why this matters: Participation reporting is no longer optional – it informs funding, equity, and policy decisions.

Communication & Documentation

Section 4 of 4

- Can you segment messages by sport, role, or clearance status?
- Is messaging archived and auditable?
- Can you document when parents received required communications?
- Are emergency contacts easily accessible during events?
- Can you communicate instantly to a single team or the entire department?
- Is there a clear separation between official communication and informal channels?
- Do coaches rely on personal text threads for compliance communication?
- Can you produce communication records if challenged?

Why this matters: Unstructured communication increases liability and erodes clarity.

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Spring Cleaning: Structure, Risk & Readiness

Strong athletic departments don't rely on memory or last-minute adjustments – they rely on clear structure. This checklist is designed to help you step back and objectively review the systems that support registration, eligibility, participation tracking, and communication across your programs. A brief, intentional review this spring can surface opportunities to simplify, strengthen, and standardize before the next school year begins.

Administrative Risks

These common patterns often signal preventable administrative strain.

- You rely on spreadsheets to track eligibility.
- Coaches collect documents independently.
- Transfer paperwork lives in email threads.
- Participation numbers are manually compiled.
- You cannot produce audit-ready reports in under 5 minutes.

If two or more apply, additional structure may prevent unnecessary strain this fall.

Traits of Strong Departments

Strong departments rely on consistent structural practices.

- Centralize documentation.
- Automate eligibility workflows.
- Track participation in real time.
- Standardize communication.
- Protect coaches through process, not memory.

These traits are less about technology and more about intentional systems that support coaches, students, and leadership.
